# The year ahead

#### Programme for 2025

The first issue this year's events schedule has already been circulated, and the response so far has been encouraging. The main events in the first half of the season are:

Fri-18 to Wed-23-Apr	<i>Raymond</i> in dry dock, and pop-up sales event Easter weekend at Braunston Marina (booked)

Thu-03-Jul	Evening visit by Barby History Group, plus short boat trip (booked)
Sat-19 & Sun-20-Jul	Cosgrove Canal Festival (TBC)
Sat-26-Jul	Linslade Canal Festival (TBC)

We also hope to attend the two events being organised by the Lichfield & Hatherton Canals Restoration Trust at Brownhills in August and at Huddlesford Junction in September, and one or more of the events planned by the Saltisford Canal Trust in Warwick to mark their 40th anniversary. And finally, we are still waiting for details of the Banbury Canal Festival which will probably be held on the weekend of 4th & 5th October. We will publish more details of events later in the season when we have more information.

#### Plans for Nutfield & Raymond

At the moment, early February, the boats are still winterised and clothed up. Both cabins have been cleared of soft furnishings, with cupboard doors and drawers left open for ventilation and small heaters in the cabin to keep down condensation.

Before the season begins, our main plans for *Nutfield* include painting the inside of the engine room and fitting a new silencer, and getting narrower top cloths to make a more satisfactory job of keeping the hold clothed for accommodation. This will also free up *Nutfield's* current cloths to replace the worn-out ones on *Raymond*. There is a new tipcat fender waiting to be fitted at Easter when we also hope to install a working range in *Nutfield's* cabin.

Work on *Raymond* will mostly take place during the Easter docking when the priorities will be yet more woodwork repairs, repairs to the cabin sides and cabin-side paintwork, painting the top planks, beams, and hatches, blacking, and repainting and decorating the deck board.

# **Review of 2024**

After an exceptionally good year in 2023, we were looking forward to building on that in 2024. However, last year did not go quite according to plan, and turned out to be a bit of a rollercoaster. Nevertheless, the bottom line is that we ended the year in considerably better financial shape than we might have expected, so it was by no means all bad news.

#### January



The year got off to a good start when the major refurbishment of *Nutfield's* cabin that was started in the autumn was finally completed.

Norman Townsend had replaced a lot of woodwork and put in a new floor, after which Will Hewitt did the painting, graining, and decoration.

The transformation from what had been a rather dingy cabin, into bright, welcoming accommodation has been quite outstanding.

#### March

In March we lost the last of our members who had been a working boater, when Alice Lapworth died. Several members of the committee represented Friends of Raymond at Alice's funeral in Nuneaton and afterwards at The Greyhound at Sutton Stop.

Born Alice Wain in the cabin of a horsedrawn boat in September 1944, Alice's early years were spent in The Potteries area until her family moved south in the mid-1950s to work for British Waterways, where she later met and married Les Lapworth.

# August

But as the weekend coincided with the cyanide spillage on the Walsall Canal that closed all the canals in the area, it may have been a blessing in disguise.

All the same, Norman and Kath took the gazebo by road to Brownhills, where we did a considerable amount of business over the two days, which prompted the thought that perhaps this was a better option than taking the boats 70 miles and through 53 narrow locks in each direction. So, depending on whether or not we get enough takers for the trip this year, we may decide to do the same thing again.

Busy Sunday morning

#### September

On a hot day in early September we took Nutfield & Raymond to Warwick for the Saltisford Canal Trust's event in the Saltisford Arm on Sunday the 8th. But in spite of the exhausting journey - it took us over 12 hours -- it was worth the effort. Norman and Kath had the gazebo set up next to the boats and we attracted a large number of visitors to both, ending the day with a decent profit and two new members. And to round off the weekend on a high, we flew home on the Monday, and were back in the marina at 6pm.

#### October

If set-backs tend to come in threes, they certainly did last year. On Thursday 3rd October, Nutfield & Raymond set off from Braunston bound for the Banbury Canal Festival on the weekend of the 5th and 6th, but got no further than Lock 12 at Napton. As the boat was entering the lock, Nutfield jammed fast between the walls at the tail of the lock, and had it not been for the spirited crew of a hire boat who agreed to come down in the lock and repeatedly ram *Nutfield's* stem post until she eventually came free, we might have been there all weekend.

The upshot of this incident was, of course, that we had to forego what was, by all accounts, a very wellattended, and potentially profitable show. But with a crew of seven on the Monday morning, we recovered the boats by reversing them back down four locks and round to the winding hole. All went perfectly and we were back in Braunston by lunchtime.

The footnote to this story is that, as a result of our reporting it to CRT, although Nutfield was not the first historic boat to jam there last year, they mounted a stoppage in the last week of January to cut back some of the brickwork to relieve the pinch point.

We will arrange a trial run in the spring to see if Nutfield can now get through the lock, and if she can, we will book the boats for this year's Banbury Festival.
